Earth conscious volunteers plant 600 shrubs

REGATTA Lake is reaping the benefits of generous people digging in to help stabilise it's banks on Earth Day.

Springfield Lakes Nature Care group president Luise Manning said about 30 people from surrounding suburbs and as far away as Jimboomba helped get 600 plants in the ground, weed and water on April 22.

"Thirty people travelled from far and wide to help restore this popular recreational walking track and lake," she said.





Mrs Manning said the event was great for the local community and students like Allen Channel who is studying a certificate three in horticulture.

It took about three hours to plant, fertilise and water the plants and the volunteers took away six garbage bags of weeds.

Soil Scientist Dr David Manning said whilst the large trees present will hold some soil back you need small ground cover like shrubs to stop the heavy drops of rain from hitting the soil directly and stop sediment run-off into the lake.
