

Is it a Cane Toad or a Frog?

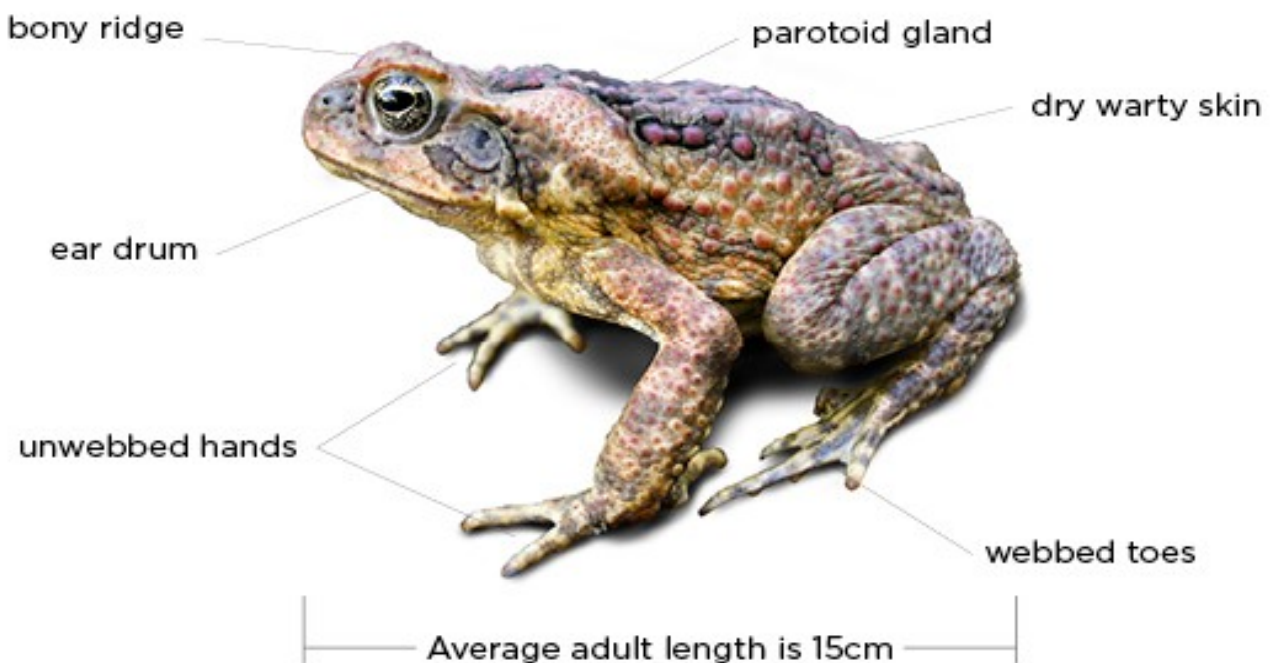
Don't risk killing a native frog!
Please check!

Cane toads have the following 5 characteristics listed below.

If it doesn't have **ALL 5** then it is unlikely to be a cane toad.

- Poison glands
- Boney ridge down the nose
- An ear drum you can see
- Dry warty skin
- Webbing on the back toes

Cane toads do not have suckers on or webbing between their front toes, which they use for digging, not swimming



By eradicating cane toads from your backyard you are helping to protect the native frogs living in your neighbourhood. These frogs can be identified by the sound of their croaks via the Australian Museum's "Frog ID App". This App can be downloaded for free from the App Store or Google play.

How to make your yard unfriendly to

Remove Food

- Uneaten pet food needs to be covered or taken in at night.
- Compost food scraps need to be covered if at ground level
- Outside lights turned off so they don't attract insects.

Create Barriers

Toad-proof barriers such as fences, shade cloth and native ground cover plants

Remove Shelter

Remove piles of bricks, timber, empty posts etc. that provide hiding places and shelter for Cane Toads.

Remove Water

Water containers outside need to be difficult for Cane Toads to access (steep sided and or off the ground)
